STATEMENT OF CHARGES

On or about March 25, 2019, ROBERT L. MEYERS, a certified peace officer with the King County Sheriff's Office, was discharged for disqualifying misconduct pursuant to RCW 43.101.010 (8)(b). The disqualifying misconduct included conduct constituting a crime involving dishonesty or false statement within the meaning of Evidence Rule 609(a), to wit: Making a False or Misleading Statement to a Public Servant. RCW 9A.76.175. The disqualifying misconduct is as follows:

**Count I**

On or around April 10, 2018 the Respondent made false or misleading statements to Sergeant Jeffrey Cunningham regarding his availability for his scheduled crisis intervention training course. The Respondent knew that Sergeant Cunningham was reasonably likely to rely upon these statements in the discharge of his official powers or duties.

**Count II**

On or about May 4, 2018, the Respondent made false or misleading statements to Sergeant David Lyon regarding the status of his scheduled crisis

1 intervention training course. The Respondent knew that Sergeant Lyon was  
2 reasonably likely to rely upon these statements in the discharge of his official powers  
3 or duties.

4 **Count III**

5 On or about May 9, 2018, the Respondent entered false or misleading  
6 information into the King County Sheriff's Office's CAD system when he purposefully  
7 used a different call sign from Deputy Ashley Diaz to disguise the fact that they were  
8 sharing a vehicle. The Respondent knew that public servants at the King County  
9 Sherrif's Office were reasonably likely to rely upon this CAD information in the  
10 discharge of their official powers or duties.

11 **Count IV**

12 On or about May 15, 2018, the Respondent made false or misleading  
13 statements to Sergeant George Drazich when he stated he arranged to work with  
14 Deputy Hancock the following day, that this arrangement was pre-planned, and that  
15 Deputy Hancock had flexed his schedule to accommodate the plan. The Respondent  
16 knew that Sergeant Drazich was reasonably likely to rely upon these statements in the  
17 discharge of his official powers or duties.

18 The discharge is final and some or all of the acts or omissions forming the  
19 basis for the discharge proceedings occurred on or after January 1, 2002.  
20 RCW 43.101.105 (1) (c) and (d).
