How Do I Become a Yakima Police Officer?

Public Safety Testing (publicsafetytesting.com) conducts the initial written and physical agility testing. The applicants who pass these initial tests are then forwarded to the Yakima Police Department for an oral interview. Applicants are then ranked based on the combined scores of the written and oral board interview.

Applicants must pass an extensive background check—regarding the applicant's aptitude, character, judgment, credit, driving record, criminal history, a medical exam, psychological exam, polygraph exam, and a second physical agility test.

Upon appointment, applicants will complete 720 hours of state testing at the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Center Basic Law Enforcement Academy (BLEA).

Upon graduation from the academy, probationary officers enter the Field Training Program and are partnered with an experienced officer for 14 weeks.

Persons seeking employment with the Yakima Police Department must possess the highest standards and abilities, including:

- Applicants must be 21 years of age of older.
- Be a US citizen or lawful permanent resident.
- Must have a good command of English, both written and verbal.
- Be a high school graduate or equivalent.
- Must be in good physical condition, good moral character, and capable of performing the full range of required duties, including physical control of violent offenders.
- Must possess normal color vision, and visual acuity of not less than 20/100 in each eye, corrected to 20/20 in the better eye and 20/30 in the lesser eye.
- Must be able to meet and maintain the department standards for firearm qualification and all State and Federal laws to possess and carry a firearm.

The Yakima Police Department is also recruiting *lateral officers*. In addition to the standards and abilities listed above, these officers must be currently certified as a law enforcement officer in their home state, have two years continuous law enforcement service within the last three years, and must successfully complete the WSCJTC Equivalency Exam within one year of employment.

Hours & Shifts

Police Officers are assigned to duties all day, every day, weekends and holidays.

Patrol Officers are assigned to a 10 hour, 40 minute shift with 4 and 5 day weekends.

Patrol Officers are assigned to one of four shifts:

- A Squad: 6:30 am—5:10 pm
- B Squad: 9:50 am—8:30 pm
- C Squad: 4:00 pm—2:40 am
- D Squad: 8:20 pm—7:00 am

Once assigned to a patrol shift, the officer stays on that shift for one calendar year.

Detectives work a ten hour shift with a three day weekend.
