

LEGISLATIVE MANDATE

Senate Bill 5167 Section 217 (16) – Within existing resources, the commission must produce a report detailing the expenditures of each agency that receives allocations from the Washington Auto Theft Prevention Authority account for fiscal year 2023, 2024, and 2025. The report must include documentation of how expenditures were used in accordance with RCW 46.66.080 and recommendations based on outcomes from prior years' expenditures for how funds from the account can be used to most effectively prevent auto theft. The report must be submitted to the Office of Financial Management, the Governor, and the legislature by October 1, 2025.



INTRODUCTION

Three agencies have been granted funding from the Washington Auto Theft Prevention Authority (WATPA) account over the last three fiscal years. These agencies are the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission (WSCJTC), Department of Corrections (DOC), and Department of Children, Youth and Families (DCYF).

Funding is provided as a pass-through grant to the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission, for the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs to direct the Washington Auto Theft Prevention Authority, per RCW 36.28A.130.

Expenditure data from all three agencies for fiscal years 2023, 2024 and 2025 is included in this report.

WASHINGTON AUTO THEFT PREVENTION AUTHORITY / WASHINGTON ASSOCIATION OF SHERIFFS AND POLICE CHIEFS

Funds used by the WATPA support activities related to education, prevention, law enforcement, investigation, and prosecution per RCW 46.66.080.

The WATPA received 8.85 million dollars in Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-2025, and 9.05 million dollars in FY 2021-2023, to fund auto theft prevention efforts. Those monies were primarily used to fund regional task force operation grants, as well as smaller grants for agencies to focus on technology and education solutions aimed at curbing auto crimes.

Public outreach is believed to have contributed to the auto theft decline. This was done through social media, radio ads, Washington State Fair outreach, and steering wheel lock distribution that targets owners of vehicles that are frequently stolen. While this is a significant accomplishment, Washington remains in the top ten in the United States in auto theft by volume and per capita.

After reviewing the last several years' expenditures and impact on auto crime, WATPA would recommend the following priorities for funding to effectively combat auto crime:

- Fund multi-agency task forces by staffing task forces around the state with detectives from
 multiple agencies, training those detectives on the latest investigative techniques, providing
 crime analysis to support the detectives, providing necessary investigative tools, and embedding
 prosecution within the task forces.
- The money that was awarded for technology in 2024 has had a positive impact in decreasing auto theft. Flock camera systems have provided an effective tool to quickly identify and notify officers of stolen vehicles as well as assist with auto theft and other investigations. Drone technology and pursuit intervention systems have also positively impacted auto theft. These intervention systems include the Grappler, Starchase, and drone technology.



- WATPA has partnered with law enforcement agencies across the state to educate our communities on how they can protect themselves from auto theft. WATPA successfully utilized social media and radio advertising to reach out to our citizens.
- WATPA provided funding for a Vehicle Crimes Conference in 2024 that was attended by 200 law enforcement professionals from around the state, where they provided 24 hours of instruction. Nationally renowned instructors were brought in to share their knowledge with attendees in the areas of basic auto theft investigation, vehicle associated fraud investigations, infotainment system extraction, classic vehicle theft investigations, basic vehicle Identification numbers identification/cloning, physical surveillance using cell phone data for auto theft investigations, heavy equipment theft investigations, fraud/synthetic ID investigations, covert tracking, submitting successful search warrant applications, using technology for vehicle crime investigations and a prosecutor's roundtable discussing successful vehicle crime investigations. Further, the conference provided an opportunity for law enforcement practitioners to discuss effective strategies with each other and establish effective collaborations to combat auto theft.
- Auto thieves often use stolen vehicles in other, more serious crimes. Prosecutors recognize this and have made auto theft a priority.
